

Мы с большой грустью узнали о недавней кончине Сергея Рогова, известного эксперта по международным отношениям, академика и научного руководителя Института США и Канады РАН.

Рогов был блестящим учёным, который посвятил свою карьеру налаживанию связей между Россией и США в академической среде и в вопросах разоружения. Его работа помогла сделать мир более безопасным для всех нас, живущих в России, США и других странах. «John Steinbruner introduced me to Sergey near the beginning of the Bush administration after Sergey convinced Ted Turner, the lead donor to the newly created Nuclear Threat Initiative, to fund joint research, education, and policy engagement activities connecting faculty and students at ISKRAN's newly created School of International Security and World Politics with those at the Center for International and Security Studies at the University of Maryland's School of Public Policy. That was a creative, constructive, hopeful response to President Bush asserting that U.S.- Russia arms control agreements were "outmoded relics of the Cold War" to be replaced by vague talk of a new strategic partnership, without investing in the new ideas and next generation of experts needed to make those words a reality.

For more than two decades, this special relationship between ISKRAN and CISSM has tried to help current and future Russian and American security experts understand each other better, reduce nuclear risks, and highlight opportunities for cooperation even when government officials are barely speaking to each other.

No matter how sick, and tired, and discouraged Sergey was, he always kept trying to advance these objectives. Now it is up to us to carry on in his memory»
